

Nia Safarr Banks, a talented costume designer from Virginia, credits her upbringing for shaping her passion for fashion and storytelling through design. In a recent conversation with Billiards VMSOA Magazine host Vania Alonnie, Nia shared her creative journey, reflecting on how her experiences growing up in Virginia have influenced her unique approach to the industry. Here's what she had to say—

## NIA SAFARRA BANAS STITCH BY STITCH

Vania: Hey y'all, We are back with the October 2024 issue of Billiards VMSOA Magazine and today, we're spotlighting 804's finest—a visionary costume designer whose work has graced stages from Richmond to New York — Nia Safarr Banks! Nia, you're doing amazing things! Congrats on everything!

Nia Safarr Banks: Thank you so much!

Vania: (Laughs) Aren't we all? So, you started costume design at 16?

Nia: Yeah! I was a theatre kid growing up and took Theatre Tech and Production in high school. I signed up for an internship at Richmond Shakespeare, which, unfortunately, doesn't exist anymore. But from there, it's been level after level up!



Vania: Wow, okay! So as a certified 804 legend, would you say that Virginia has influenced your work as a costume designer?

Nia: Yeah, a little bit. When it comes to period pieces, anything pre-1980s, I tend to look locally. I go to the library, research, and follow historic Richmond accounts on social media for inspiration. Growing up in Virginia, surrounded by entertainment, music, and dance—those moments definitely had an influence.

Vania: You've designed costumes for productions all across the country. Which ones have been some of your most transformative projects, and why?

Nia: Last summer, I did Hamlet at the American Shakespeare Center. It was my first big Shakespeare show, and the director gave me a lot of freedom. He wanted a clear visual difference between the older and younger generations, and he wanted everyone to stand out. That's the kind of collaboration I thrive on. Plus, I've met amazing people along the way, like Quan, one of the founders of this. We met recently, and it's been project after project ever since!

Vania: When you get these types of notes for costume design—something more conceptual rather than specific like colors or silhouettes—how do you turn that into something physical?

Nia: It can be tricky! Directors often speak in abstract concepts, so you have to learn how to communicate with them. I didn't fully understand that until grad school. Directors often speak more in terms of emotion or feeling, while designers are talking about colors, shapes, and space. It's all about bridging that gap.



Vania: That's so fascinating! You've worked in theaters across Virginia—how do you think Virginia's theatre scene compares to the broader national stage?

Nia: It's definitely a vibrant scene, but we have challenges. For example, Virginia Repertory Theatre is struggling right now, and they need to raise \$600K to keep their doors open. It's unfortunate because the pandemic hit the industry hard. Nationally, we're seeing big names brought into theatre to draw people back in, but Virginia doesn't have the same resources to do that.

Vania: Right, but it feels like the scene is on the rise! And looking at your Instagram, your work really stands out. What influences your costume design style?


Nia: I don't think I have a set style-it all depends on how much access I have to the team. It's never about just my costumes, but the overall visual look of the production. It's all about collaboration-working with the lighting designer, the actors, and the set designers to make everything cohesive.

Vania: You're transitioning into TV and film now, right? How's that going?

Nia: Yes, I just joined the union and I'm learning the ropes. It's a completely different world compared to theatre. In TV and film, things move much faster. You have to be on your toes-once filming starts, there's no stopping or switching things out like in theatre. But I love that spontaneity!

Since this interview Virginia Rep has met their goal and raised over 600k!






ultimate dream?


Nia: Absolutely! Give me a date and a budget, and I'm there. I love collaborating with friends, and it's exciting to be part of creative communities like this.

## NILE Price, Who's the man behind the name?

"I'm a humanist and a storyteller at heart," Price explains. "I live by one of JFK's quotes, 'Ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for you country.' But I replace 'country' with 'humanity.' My work is about serving humanity."

## The Journey from Law to Filmmaking

Originally, Price intended to pursue law, with dreams of entering politics. "I wanted to be the first Black president, but Barack Obama beat me to it," he jokes. His introduction to filmmaking came unexpectedly when he took a photography class in high school and later became involved with his school's daily announcements. "I'd sneak back into the school studio after hours to teach myself how to edit," he recalls. That was the beginning of his passion for film, a passion that took root and evolved over time.

## Virginia's Influence

"Virginia has a poetic feel," Price says, explaining how his home state's history and culture have influenced his work. "Filmmakers rarely showcase life from Virginia or the South in an authentic way. But Virginia has such a rich texture, and I'm drawn to exploring its history and the intersection of time and lineage in my films."

## Why Film?

For Price, filmmaking is more than just a career.

"It's the only thing I know how to do," he admits.

Growing up as a sick child, he found solace in movies.

"They were my escape, my education, my window to the world. I owe a debt of gratitude to film—it was always there for me."

## The Power of Storytelling

A pivotal moment for Price came when he created a short video for his high school's graduation ceremony. The emotional response from his classmates' families made him realize the impact a single frame can have. "Hearing how the video moved people showed me the power of film. That's when I knew this was my path."

## On Collaboration and Teaching:

Price emphasizes the importance of collaboration in filmmaking, comparing it to a dance of trust and creativity. "You have to put your ego aside and serve the story," he says. As a professor at VCU, he imparts lessons of presence and stillness to his students. "You need to be present in the world around you to create impactful art. That's the key to great storytelling."

## **FINAL WORDS**

"To all the filmmakers out there, be present, be patient, and always serve the story," Price advises. His journey, from Richmond to NYU, from dreaming of law to iving his passion in film, is a testament to perseverance and purpose.

Beyond the stage, Nia Simone describes herself as an "auntie" to Jedi and Juno, and as someone deeply rooted in community and activism. "In another life, I'd be out there riding with Angela Davis."

"There's a lot of great art happening in Virginia that people don't realize, especially in the Tidewater area. You just have to want to find it."

### The Process

VOU Rehearsal For Colored Girls 2024 "For me, the process begins with the material. Where is the excitement? How does my body react to it? Then I go into auditions or callbacks ready to show them my idea of how I can exist in that world."

Nia's approach to a role is deeply intuitive and connected to the text.

"This process has grabbed me by the shoulders and shook me. It's tumultuous, inspiring, beautiful, and messy. You have to be fully present-it can't be calculated. You're responsible for creating the world on stage." Her current challenge, For Colored Girls,

has been a transformative experience.


### What's Next?

"Grad school wasn't always on my radar, but my mentors put it in my ear, and now I'm fully committed to this next step."


After graduation, Nia plans to pursue graduate school

"Something a mentor told me that changed everything: It's not about how talented you are, but how connected you are to yourself. That applies not just to acting, but to life. Stay connected to who you are."








